

opportunities — and the barriers — to building upon Kentucky's existing energy efficiency efforts. Action items that will be discussed include:

- A mechanism to track energy efficiency gains from utility-run efficiency program;
- Expanding current state-run programs, such as Kentucky Home Performance;
- Investing in more robust education of energy efficiency principles and program offerings; and
- Increasing financial incentives for industrial and commercial energy users to invest in energy-saving upgrades.

Coming just a month after the 2012 General Election, at this luncheon presentation we
will evaluate the outcome of the election and the potential implications for national
and state energy policy. With the Presidency and both Houses of Congress in the
balance, and potential significant shifts in the makeup of the Kentucky General
Assembly, this year's election has the potential to lead to significant changes in energy policy — or just more of the same. This session will take up that question.

What is "Clean" Energy? Does it Include Fossil Fuels? Can Coal be Part of a "Clean" Economy?

Coal has been the target of a concerted national campaign for several years, based in large part on concerns about air emissions associated with coal-fired electricity generation. Yet coal remains an essential part of the Kentucky economy, both for good-paying mining jobs and for the provision of electricity at some of the most competitive rates in the nation. And the nation as a whole remains heavily dependent on coal and other fossil fuels for its basic energy needs. In this session we will examine the question of what constitutes "clean" energy and whether coal has a place in a "clean energy economy." Dr. Andrews will address ongoing efforts to preserve coal's future as an environmentally sound and economically competitive energy option in Kentucky and nationwide, including research into cleaner coal-burning technologies.

As energy demand continues to increase and challenges to the use of coal intensify, the demand for natural gas as an alternative energy source continues to grow. Moreover, the process of hydraulic fracturing ("fracking") is literally flooding the energy market with abundant supplies of inexpensive natural gas. But what does all this mean for Kentucky and for Kentucky business? Does Kentucky have any role to play in the fracking boom? And will natural gas prove to be a reliable, affordable and environmentally sound source of energy in the short- and long-term? This session will examine the benefits of natural gas as a relatively clean energy source, as well as the economic and environmental challenges that it poses.

Booth will discuss recent efforts by Kentucky's natural resource industry to reach out to foreign markets and promising transactions in the pipeline to supply those growing energy needs.

A recent study commissioned by the Kentucky General Assembly examined what can or cannot be done to address the concerns of Kentucky's aluminum smelters, who are facing increasing energy costs at the same time that worldwide aluminum prices are depressed. The so-called "smelter study" – known officially as "Energy Rate Impacts on Kentucky Industry" – raises questions not just about how Kentucky can support a regionally important industry like the aluminum smelters, but also about how Kentucky should address economic challenges faced by other businesses in a time of increasing energy costs and uncertainty. We will discuss what the Smelter Study did – and did not – find, and what the entire exercise may mean for Kentucky's long-term business retention and attraction policies and strategy.
